

If waived, the student will need to select 3 additional business upper-division credits to total 48. Students must discuss the internship requirement with their advisor early in the semester, before registering for this course.

Major electives may include courses listed here. In addition 300- or 400-level business courses may be used, but an Academic Petition must be approved before the course(s) can be counted toward the degree. Please see your advisor before selecting your 9 credits of upper-division electives. Students must satisfy course prerequisites before registering.

NOTE: A total of 120 credits is required for the BBA degree, 48 of which must be upper-division. At least 50% of the business credits (ACCT, BA, CIS, ECON, LGOP and LOG) required for the BBA degree must be earned at the University of Alaska Anchorage.

Admission to Upper-Division Standing does not waive individual course prerequisites (e.g., course pre-requisites for BA 377 are: BA 273 and MATH 221/251).

Students are required to complete a minimum of three credits of Alaska Native-Themed GER coursework from the approved GER list. If the course is also categorized as a GER (in a separate category), it can overlap and count for both categories. If this overlap occurs, then for this planning sheet, students will fulfill these 3 credits with an Elective instead (see note 1 above).
