Teresa Jacobsson, Gwich'in | Yup'ik is the founder of JW Industries Group and Alchemy Tribal Services. She has held multiple executive positions for several ANCSA corporations, tribes and tribal entities and has served as director of The Eva Foundation and is the founder and president of the Alaska Tribal Administrators Association and the Alaska Women's Leadership Forum.
